

## L.I.V.E F.I.T: Towards Injury-Free Training

BG Lim added, "Unit operational readiness is affected when soldiers become unfit for duty and training. At the same time, having Full-Time National Servicemen downgraded due to injury disrupts the cohesiveness of our mono-intake units."

BG Lim launched a 90-minute DVD produced by the Soldier Performance Centre and Army Medical Command (AMC), entitled "Prevention and Management of Sports Injury - A Personal Responsibility". Ms Audrey Lim, Head Physiotherapist at HQAMC, explained that the DVD would be distributed to all training institutes and medical centres to be shown as part of their training schedules. She said, "There was a growing awareness among commanders that downgrading due to musco-skeletal problems were giving them manpower problems, and more units have been asking us for talks on this subject matter. This made us realise the need for such a DVD." This DVD will be supplemented by posters and pamphlets to disseminate basic information on injury prevention and management relevant to the soldiers.

The excited cries of IWO Tommy Shee, Medical Warrant Officer, HQ Armour, could be heard from afar as he urged his group to complete as many forward lunges as possible. IWO Shee and his group were participating in "The Race to Fitness" at the L.I.V.E Fitness thru' Injury-free Training (L.I.V.E F.I.T) Seminar held on 21 July at Kranji camp.

The L.I.V.E F.I.T Seminar was attended by BG Hugh Lim, Commander TRADOC, who in his speech commented on the loss of combat-fit soldiers to musco-skeletal injuries. He said, "Many of these injuries are in fact preventable, yet sadly, we have observed that such injuries often increase in severity, or become chronic due to improper post-injury management."

There was also an interactive segment called the "Race to Fitness" in which participants watched parts of the DVD and perform tasks which tested them on the information shown in the video. IWO Shee felt that the event was a very unique learning experience. He said, "It was educational and fun at the same time, giving us the opportunity to practice what we have just learnt."

## Combat Intelligence under one roof



CIG will fulfil the expanded roles and functions of Army Intelligence to meet future demands and challenges

In his address, COA highlighted the role and importance of CIG in the 3rd Generation Army. COA said, "CIG is the dedicated ground specialist headquarters for Army Intelligence to effectively fulfil operational demands while driving training and force development in the delivery of 3rd Generation Army Combat Intelligence capabilities. Over the past year, CIG has gradually grown in strength and in the process, made significant contributions to Our Army's Transformation efforts."

As part of G2-Army's restructuring to support Our Army's 3rd Generation Transformation, the Combat Intelligence Group (CIG) was formed in April 2005. With the School of Military Intelligence (SMI) and 1st Military Intelligence Battalion (1 MI Bn) under its command, CIG will fulfil the expanded roles and functions of Army Intelligence to meet the new demands and challenges of the future. While CIG has been operational for more than a year, 27 July marked the coming together of the components and its HQ under one roof at Pasir Laba Camp. Chief of Army (COA), MG Desmond Kuek officially opened the new "Home of Army Intelligence" at the Inauguration Ceremony.

COA presented Head CIG, COL Allan Pang Buck Liang his Letter of Appointment. He also presented the Intelligence Formation Badges to the CIG Key Appointment Holders. Later in the ceremony, the Intelligence Training Hub was also unveiled. Complementing the Smart Classrooms, which offers distributed and interactive training at the intelligence troop level, the hub will be exploited as a dedicated intelligence command and staff training facility in the School of Military Intelligence (SMI). Aligned with the Army's effort to exploit the benefits of simulation training, the Intelligence Training Hub will be equipped with advanced training simulation systems. These will replicate realistic and challenging operating conditions to facilitate the conduct of professional skills training in intelligence analysis as well as mission monitoring.

## Recognising Total Defence Contributions

### NSmen of the Year Awards

LTC (NS) Tan Wee Jen from Civil Military Relations remembered a half-year period in 2004 during which he was recalled several times for special duties, including the post-tsunami Operation Flying Eagle in Aceh. ### Total Defence Awards

The Total Defence Awards were presented to 191 companies in recognition of their support for NS and the important roles of the civil resource owners in helping the SAF maintain a high level of operational readiness. Ten employers and civil resource owners were conferred the Minister for Defence

Award, the highest accolade that an employer or civil resource owner can achieve. One of them was the National University of Singapore (NUS), which was also cited by Mr Teo in his speech. He said, "NUS has an efficient system in place to ensure that each department is aware of the recall requirements of its NSmen, and also the ensure that the department immediately releases NSmen on recall." Mr Teo also commended NUS encouraging their staff to attend re-dedication ceremonies to renew their commitment to the nation. NUS's Deputy President for Administration, Mr Joseph P Mullinx said, "It's very important for Singapore to have bright, fit and operationally ready individuals. NUS sees itself developing and training the minds of the individual - that is critical in the long term."

## Temasek Seminar: Learning More About National Security

"The Singapore Prism - Unifying Lights of Diversity" This theme won the National Junior College the tagline competition as part of the 16th annual Temasek Seminar, held on 26 July at the SAFTI Military Institute. More than 400 students from 18 schools participated in the Seminar, which allowed them to learn more about Singapore's public service, security and economic issues.

The event was headed by Minister for Defence, Mr Teo Chee Hean. In his keynote address, Mr Teo spoke about how Singapore overcame adversity to become a "world city". This term was coined by Sir Peter Hall in 1966 to describe exceptional cities that played critical roles in global affairs. Mr Teo felt that Singapore has achieved this status, and emphasised on the importance of security and stability to allow for continued prosperity. He said, "The bedrock of our defence and security has been, and will continue to be a capable and committed SAF. We have built up the SAF as a competent force, able to deter aggression and capable of defending our sovereignty against external aggressors."

In conjunction with the seminar, the students had earlier participated in workshops and visited places such as the SAF Centre for Military Experimentation. There they learnt how Our Army has been transforming to counter new security threats such as terrorism and training our soldiers more efficiently.

## New Home for Armoured Engineers

Armoured Engineers came into existence as the Engineer Tank Company in May 1970 at Gillman Camp. In 1974, the

unit was temporarily housed in Kranji Camp as it awaited the completion of Sungei Gedong Camp. In April 1976, the unit was finally relocated to its present modern premises at Sungei Gedong Camp 1, where the name 38th Battalion, Singapore Combat Engineers was adopted.

24 July saw the groundbreaking for the new home of the Armoured Engineers, officiated by Chief Engineer Officer, COL Teo Jing Siang. In his speech, COL Teo said, "We are here not only to witness the building of a new home but also a new beginning for the Armoured Engineers community. This infrastructure development shall also facilitate the Armoured Engineers to transit into the 3rd Generation Engineers."

COL Teo explained that these changes, among others, would "enhance training and operational efficiencies, and most importantly the cohesion of the battalion."

## Milestone for Armour Training

Against the backdrop of twenty-six armoured vehicles majestically lined up on the parade square, a glass prism emerged on a platform from the back of a Bionix Armoured Fighting Vehicle. This unique sight occurred at the Armour Training Institute (ATI) Commissioning Parade on 31 July, which heralded the transformation of Armour training. Officiated by COA, MG Desmond Kuek, a commemorative coin was inserted into the prism to activate the launch of the ATI logo.

The commissioning of the ATI is a milestone for the Armour Formation, as it consolidates its training school and centres under one unifying command. ATI has three centres of excellence - The Armour Leadership Center/ School of Armour, Armour Combat Training Center and the Armoured Battle Group Training Center. They will allow for more efficient and effective training based on sound pedagogies, with a greater emphasis on faculty development, thereby paving the way

for Armour's transformation. Commander ATI, LTC Tan Kay Chuan said, "The Institute will concentrate on creating an environment that will nurture leadership development in our people. At the same time, the core competencies vital to Armour will be brought to the fore and emphasised." 3SG Clifton Tay commented, "As a trainee, I feel that training in the ATI has been made more effective with the infusion of new training methodologies into the curriculum. # Urban Ops

## The New Dimension in Warfare

It is evident that with increasing urbanisation, the battlefields of the future will not just be fields and forests but also the concrete jungle. Our Army is fully prepared to achieve swift and decisive victory in such an environment.

In July, Minister for Defence, Mr Teo Chee Hean, visited Sarimbun Urban Training Facility, where Our Army's urban operations trial battalion, 3rd Battalion, Singapore Infantry Regiment (3 SIR) demonstrated the

skills and technology they possess through an action-packed, scenario-based display.

Augmented by sophisticated technology to gain an information upper-hand and well-drilled in the use of specialised urban warfare tactics, the 3 SIR soldiers stormed enemy troops holed up in the Urban Training Facility.

Commanding Officer of 3 SIR, LTC Simon Chang explained, "The increasing urban environment is much more complex than conventional ones. It has not only enemies but also civilians. This means our soldiers will have to apply strict rules of engagement, differentiating enemies from civilians and also coping with various situations like dealing with civilians who need help or are hostile. In addition, the enemy can hide much better in urban areas, so we must make use of technology and apply new fighting concepts to be effective here."



7 Mines are a real menace in the urban war zone. Our Army's Mine-Clearing Vehicles are capable of speedily thrashing a safe path through minefields for the safe passage of our vehicles and troops.




5 6 Armoured forces and the Apache Attack Helicopters provide the heavy firepower to neutralise any strong enemy ground resistance. But big guns and fearsome hellfire missiles will only truly be effective if targets are quickly pinpointed out to these platforms. To do so, our soldiers on the ground work hand in hand with the Apaches and Armoured forces to provide a highly co-ordinated and effective attack.



1 The Push-to-Talk wireless radio mounted on the handguard of the SAR21 rifle, enhances radio communications on the battlefield as it allows for its usage while maintaining a fire-ready posture. This is important due to the fast-paced and close-combat nature of urban warfare.



The Battlefield Management System (BMS) links each team to a network so they can see the location of our own forces and the enemy's, obtaining real-time tactical information. A handheld computer displays the information, improving our soldiers' tactical and situational awareness.



4 The battalion will have medics equipped and trained to deal with the emergency treatment and evacuation of wounded soldiers in an urban setting. Special equipment like the vertical evacuation system (above) allow for the movement of wounded soldiers through narrow corridors and down multi-storied buildings.



2 The fibre optic scope, FIBUA Surveillance Ball and Round-Corner-Firing Device let our soldiers see into a room without exposing themselves to enemy's fire.

3 Remote-controlled Surveillance Cars and Unmanned Aerial Vehicles provide valuable battlefield information from different angles. The wide array of sensors gives our commanders a greater understanding of the combat situation and hence make better decisions.

## Innovating the Command Post

### HQ Armour has the Containerised CP Up and Running



Setting up the Containerised CP

In line with the experimentation efforts of our 3rd Generation Army, HQ Armour was tasked with the design and testing of a Containerised Command Post (Containerised CP) for command and control of high tempo operations in the battlefield of the future.

This Containerised CP project was spear-

headed by then-Deputy Chief Armour Officer (Dy CAO), COL Andrew Lim. Working with branches in HQ Armour, Defence Science and Technology Agency (DSTA) and Singapore Technologies, the group focused on developing a mobile and easily deployable Containerised CP. Four months was all it took from its conceptualisation to deployment in

outfield trials. Commenting on his experience in leading this project, COL Lim remarked, "This project was very satisfying to the team as it resulted in not only a well-designed and highly functional command post but one that effectively embodies the 3rd Generation Command and Control concepts as well. We are confident that the Containerised CP will significantly enhance the effectiveness of future Army operations."

The Containerised CP can perform any task required of a standard Army field command post, and much more. As its deployment is mechanised, it only takes four to six people and only eight to twelve minutes to set up the Containerised CP, less than half the time required for the deployment of conventional command posts. The container itself is loaded onto a High Mobility Cargo Transporter (HMCT) platform, and can be unloaded when necessary. This gives it the flexibility to be transferred to another vehicle in the event of a breakdown. Furthermore, the Containerised CP is designed such that all systems are fully integrated, giving commanders the ability to begin their mission planning shortly after it is deployed. CPL Albert Kang (right), a signaller involved

in the trials of the Containerised CP said, "The Containerised CP has made our work more efficient and streamlined by removing the highly heavy manual work and messy cables, without compromising the security and integration of the systems."

Chief Armour Officer (CAO), BG Wong Ann Chai commended the Containerised CP

project team for their innovative effort in the development of the Containerised CP. He said, "We must be ready to embrace the ingenuity and innovative idea of our people as part of our transformation to a 3G Army. I would like to thank the engineers and commanders who have made this idea of the Containerised CP a reality and together with all other partners who have contributed in making this project a thorough success."


The Provost unit also took part in the "Islands of Opportunities" mass display segment, all clad in stylish costumes and shiny iron helmets.

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# CSS Shines at SUMAN Warrior

This year's Exercise SUMAN Warrior was indeed a milestone for Combat Service Support (CSS) Command. This was the first time that a CSS-centric SUMAN Warrior exercise was held. In a short time after the recent reorganisation of Our Army, CSS Command has demonstrated the ability to take great strides in further developing its professionalism and capabilities. This was exemplified through the performance of our 60-man CSS contingent led by Commander Army Logistics Training Institute, COL Logathan. More than two hundred troops from United Kingdom, Australia, New Zealand, Malaysia and Singapore gathered in Townsville, Australia for the exercise under the Five Power Defence Arrangements (FPDA). Hosted by ADF from 3 to 14 July, the exercise aimed to develop co-operation and interoperability between the FPDA nations.

The exercise was executed smoothly, with valuable lessons learnt by all participants.

Commented MAJ Bernard Sabai, Chief Instructor at Ordnance Engineering Training Institute, "This exercise has allowed us to tap the tacit knowledge of the experienced staff of different countries. This is knowledge that cannot be found in documents but are gained through interaction, both at the professional and social levels."

An integrated CSS provides effective, responsive and comprehensive support for our fighting troops. This can act as an invaluable deterrent to any potential aggressor. I truly value the lessons learnt here."

## L.I.V.E at SUMAN Warrior

Commander CSS Command, COL Ngien Hoon Ping, together with Chief Army Medical Officer, COL Teo Kwang Joo, paid a visit to our CSS troops on 10 and 11 July. In his exhortation to our soldiers, COL Ngien said, "Our L.I.V.E framework should also be exemplified wherever we are and not only when we are home. What you have already done thus far with your excellent teamwork and leadership is a demonstration of our image and identity. We are here not just to learn and contrib-

This was done through reflection sessions held almost nightly to ensure that the knowledge gained was shared with each other. It is this leadership that allowed us to project ourselves professionally, thus enabling the Army CSS flag to be carried high in Exercise SUMAN Warrior 06."

LTA Luo Wee Phing, a Transport Officer from Transport Command, felt that the exercise served to reinforce CSS's image and identity. He said, "The fact that we worked together and got along amazingly well reassured me that we can truly achieve a decisive victory should the need arise. In addition, wearing our Formation and Vocation badges for the first time evoked in all of us a deep sense of pride and identity."
