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Ex Wallaby 05

The largest air-land integration exercise was held in this year's Exercise Wallaby from 14 Oct to 27 Nov 05 with more than 4000 personnel and equipment from the RSAF and the Army participating. RSAF's assets included the F-16C/D Fighting Falcons from 143 SQN, Searcher Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (UAV) from 128 SQN, Super Pumas from 126 SQN, C-130 Hercules from 122 SQN and Air Defence Artillery systems including the Mechanised Igla system from Divisional Air Defence Artillery Brigade (DAB). Personnel from 201 SQN, Tactical Air Command Post squadron and 1 Medical Squadron (1MS) also participated in the six-week exercise held at Shoalwater Bay Training Area (SWBTA), Queensland, Australia.



The SWBTA, which is four times the size of Singapore, presented training opportunities not readily available back home. LT Dan Ho, a flight navigator from 122 SQN, commented,

"Most of the time we only get to practise executing low-level missions during such overseas exercises. It's also true that without this exercise, we, as operators, would not know the overall situation. The exercise gave me a wider perspective as to how the Army operates, how helicopters and fighters operate."

Indeed, training in Exercise Wallaby was carried out at three levels — training within the squadron, between different units

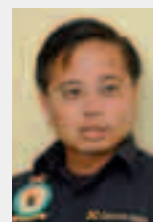
in the RSAF and Army and finally the integrated operations with various units participating in the exercise. For SSG Julian Sim, an aircrew specialist in 126 SQN, the exercise was an eye-opener. In

Exercise Wallaby, 126 SQN, besides other missions with the Army and RSAF, helped 1MS to evaluate the Air Mobile Life Support Units and Heliborne Medical Evacuation teams, used for the first time in an overseas exercise since achieving Initial Operating Capability in May 05. "We got to do some hands-on, helping out the medics and doctors," said SSG Sim. "In this respect, we found ourselves doing more than just basic roles like troop lift; it's been refreshing and more fulfilling."



While Exercise Wallaby has previously featured fighters in the A4-SU Super Skyhawk, the F-16 Fighting Falcons that were here for the first time added new dimensions to the exercise. CO 143

SQN, LTC Dennis Loh, explained, "What the F-16 really brings to the table is its multi-role capability. The F-16 is capable of carrying out air-to-air and air-to-ground missions, and we can even do this at night. Especially with the integration of the UAV into our mission, the F-16 can carry a greater payload of weapons, thus enhancing the effectiveness of our missions. The F-16 brings a lot of flexibility and survivability to the air dimension here."



Still, the new environment posed challenges for the detachment. SSG Donus Hoo from 143 SQN noted, "Not many facilities were suitable for fighters here because we were using a commercial airport throughout the exercise. Through liaisons with the airport operators, we managed to get the equipment and space needed for the detachment to operate here safely."

Exercise Wallaby culminated in an integrated strike and live-firing demonstration on 21 Nov 05, showcasing the results of months of preparation and the honed integrated capabilities of the RSAF and Army. The RSAF participated in this exercise deploying the UAV for

battlefield surveillance and targeting, the F-16 conducting strike sorties, heliborne medical evacuation and resupply, while armoured brigades advanced and destroyed an 'enemy'. COMD 25

Div/Chief Armour Officer and Army Exercise Director, BG Wong Ann Chai, remarked, "It's the first time we have brought so many moving parts together in a live firing exercise and the Army is constantly finding new and creative ways to interface with the RSAF every day. This exercise is the result of six months of close interaction and co-operation between the RSAF and Armour. What we have seen here in the demonstration is just the initial fruits of this labour."



The success of the demonstration is a step forward for the RSAF in its road to become a 3G force. The unprecedented scale and complexity of the exercise was in itself a success, as then CO

6 DA BN, LTC Sebastian Benhur, noted, "Now we are going into a higher level of integration and therefore complexities, which demands more focus, preparation and dedication for effective execution. So to bring it to this level, execute the operations here and then see the combination of hardware, software and heartware fall into place, the soldiers here can see for themselves that complex manoeuvres can actually work in an organised and safe way."

CO 41 SAR, LTC Kenneth Liow, echoed his sentiments, "I think this is an unique

exercise in that the battalion got to see every facet of the RSAF, not just upfront in destroying and defeating the enemy, but also in resupplying our forces and evacuating our casualties. I feel it shows that we are not alone and we have friends in the air supporting us."



Besides strengthening the individual and joint capabilities of the various units, air-land power experimentation in various slices was also another key feature of this exercise. "One of the things we are looking at is network centricity", said Commander Tactical Air Support Command and RSAF Air Director, COL Richard Pereira. "By networking our various capabilities and developing systems that are more responsive and

time sensitive, we would become an even more effective, integrated force, which is in tandem with shaping our 3G transformation journey."

On experimentation opportunities in Wallaby, COL Pereira added, "Some of these operational experiments may be difficult to carry out at home due to space constraints or other limitations, so bringing the different moving parts and people together at SWBTA to validate and translate these experiments into tangible operations enables us to take a big step forward for RSAF's transformation."



Still, there were challenges in validating these experiments. Head Command, Control, Communications, Computers and Information Test Centre (C4ITC), Air Plans Department, LTC Tay Chye Bin, who

led a team to experiment with concepts that would enhance air-land integration, explained, "As this is the first time we are fielding experimental systems in an overseas operational exercise in such a large scale and of such great complexity, many of the operational systems were not linked to the experimental systems, so we would have to look into how the different systems could communicate

and integrate with each other safely and effectively given the short span of time we have. Fortunately we had a group of dedicated Defence Science and Technology Agency (DSTA) engineers who worked conscientiously and contributed significantly to the successful integration of both the live assets and the experimental systems we had brought along."

The success of Exercise Wallaby and the live demonstration has validated the new concepts and given the RSAF new insights into potential areas to make these concepts even more robust. The exercise also underscores the excellent defence relations between Singapore and Australia, who are both members of the Five Power Defence Arrangements.

12th Exercise Cope Tiger Launched

The RSAF, Royal Thai Air Force (RTAF), the United States Air Force (USAF)/ United States Marine Corps opened Exercise Cope Tiger in a ceremony held at Paya Lebar Air Base (PLAB) on 30 Nov 05. The ceremony, officiated by Chief of Air Force, MG Lim Kim Choon; Chief of Air Staff of the RTAF, ACM Sukumpol Suwanatat; Vice-Commander of the General George C. Kenny Headquarters (Provisional) and Commander, Pacific Air Operations Centre, Hickam Air Force Base, Brigadier-General Gregory J. Ihde, declared the start of the Command Post Exercise (CPX) phase. The two-day CPX saw participants from the air forces train together in mission planning exercises and mission commanders' training, thus gaining further insight and understanding of each other's operating procedures. "As always," COMD PLAB and RSAF Exercise Director, COL Peter Ware added, "the main challenge

is to be able to deliver realistic and relevant training for the people involved in a highly dynamic and safe manner. This way we can continue to expand the usefulness and the relevance of this exercise in developing the combat readiness of the three countries." The second phase of the exercise, the Flying Training Exercise, will be held at Korat from 6 to 17 Feb 06.

Held annually since 1994, Exercise Cope Tiger has enhanced the professionalism and interoperability of the air forces. "It's been a great opportunity for us to challenge and get to know one another and grow the exercise in size and complexity every year," said USAF Exercise Director, COL Jeffery L. LeVault. Echoing his sentiments was RTAF Exercise Director, GPCAPT Songtam Chokkanapitag, "COL Peter Ware was my friend when we worked together during Exercise Air Thai Sing a while ago. I believe such exercises will strengthen the bonds between the RSAF and the RTAF and this will benefit both our air forces."

International Military Testing Association Conference 2005

The 47th International Military Testing Association (IMTA) Conference, held for the first time in Asia from 8 to 10 Nov 05, gathered practitioners and professionals from around the world at the Pan Pacific Hotel. The Conference organised by the Applied Behavioural Sciences Department (ABSD) from MINDEF attracted more than 300 military personnel and civilians, including over 100 participants from overseas armed forces and non military agencies.

"The IMTA is an important forum for the exchange and discussion of research results, ideas and techniques," said Dr Tan Kim Siew, Permanent Secretary (Defence Development), who was the Guest of Honour at the opening of the conference. In his keynote address, Dr Tan said, "Concerns about the ability and will of our soldiers to fight and remain resilient in the face of adversity will be as relevant today as ever. This is where the field of

behavioural sciences can contribute. And this is where the IMTA has much to offer. As a gathering of behavioural scientists and practitioners working in the military from different parts of the world, it provides a platform for the fertile cross-pollination of ideas and sharing of best practices."

With the theme of "Supporting Military Transformation and Operations in a Changing World", the conference

presented topics not only on behavioural sciences, but for the first time, included a Human Resource track to discuss human resource challenges such as job proficiency testing, training, leadership and organisational behaviour, personnel management and manpower analyses. Presenters included keynote speaker, Future Systems Architect, BG Jimmy Khoo; Head Air Manpower, COL Tan Swee Bock; and officers from Aeromedical Centre.

Pushing the Boundaries of Reality

A pilot gets into the cockpit of his F-16D Fighting Falcon and takes off at maximum allowable weight, against strong wind. After take-off he has to traverse a thunderstorm on route to his target. Along the way he encounters adversarial aircraft and is forced to engage it in aerial battle. The pilot fights, his aircraft sustains damage and he's forced to return to base and perform an emergency landing.

Scenarios such as these have been recreated on a daily basis at the Flight Simulator Centre since the introduction of two new fighter aircraft simulators to the facility.



The dual seat configuration of the F-16 OFT allows pilots and Weapon Systems Officers (Fighter) to train together. "Without the new OFT, the first time they would fly together would be in the actual aircraft," said CO, FSC LTC Mike Yeo (left). "If they can train in a simulator first, then in actual flying their learning curve would be accelerated," he added.

The F-5 OFT, developed locally by ST Electronics boasts an avionics upgrade that allows pilots to practise their avionics management and system handling. It provides pilots with a

emergency procedures as well as various air-to-air and air-to-ground missions. With their introduction, FSC now has a simulator for every fighter platform in the RSAF, under one roof. The simulators were officially commissioned on 26 Oct 05 at FSC in a ceremony graced by Chief of Air Force MG Lim Kim Choon.

The F-16C/D Operational Flight Trainer is a dual-seat cockpit simulator – a first in the RSAF. The simulator is capable of covering the full spectrum of F-16 operations - providing basic training in aircraft handling, instrument flying, night flying and emergencies as well as tactical training in areas of team coordination, contingency planning and in-flight decision making.

realistic virtual air combat arena created by a combination of advanced databases, high resolution displays, reactive computer generated entities, cockpit mock-up and augmenters such as G-suit and active control loading.

As close to actual flying as training on the new simulators may be, FSC continues to push the boundaries of realism. There are already plans to link up the new F-16 and F-5 simulators, hence pitting pilot against pilot rather than against an "artificial intelligence". Such an achievement, when accomplished, would be a first for the institution and yet another step towards RSAF's goal of emerging as a 3rd Generation Air Force.

Budding Pilots, Eager Youth

Timothy Phua Xi Sheng, 18 and Gilbert Tay, 17 became the envy of their fellow Singapore Youth Flying Club course mates as they were rewarded with a coveted flight onboard an RSAF F-16D Fighting Falcon jet. The incentive flight, held on 25 Nov 05 at Tengah Air Base, is part of the Singapore Youth Flying Club (SYFC)-RSAF Orientation programme, which serves as an incentive to SYFC students who have displayed exceptional flight knowledge and capabilities. Phua and Tay flew in the dual seat cockpits of jets piloted by MAJ Lee Joon Guan and CPT Jeffrey Nah respectively.

Though it wasn't their first time flying in the cockpit of an aircraft, the budding pilots admitted that their flight on board the F-16s was markedly different from anything they had ever experienced.

"There's a whole world of difference, be it in terms of aircraft performance, conditions or the altitudes in which we fly," said

Gilbert. "The planes we fly don't have afterburners and so even at full power, we only feel a slight push," said Timothy.

Both Gilbert and Timothy have applied to sign on to the RSAF as pilots and hence the familiarisation flight provided a brief insight into what could possibly be their future careers. "It has certainly made us a lot more informed and has given us much greater first hand knowledge, even before actually stepping into the RSAF," added Gilbert. "It's certainly a good headstart!"

Other than its Flying Training Course, the Singapore Youth Flying Club also conducts a Co-Curricular Activities Programme which aims to impart the passion of flying to students, from an early age of 13. While the course previously existed as a mere enrichment programme dedicated to Aeromodelling – the building and flying of model airplanes – the endorsement of a new syllabus by MOE in 2000 has made it much more than that.

Aeromodelling still remains the core of the syllabus: students learn basic aerodynamics, how to interpret blueprints and subsequently apply this knowledge by building and flying model airplanes, through their four years of secondary studies. In addition, they are exposed to numerous other aviation related activities such as flying experiences onboard RSAF aircraft like the C-130 Hercules and Chinook helicopters, aviation industry visits and outdoor adventure training camps. Such additional activities provide an added dimension to the growth of students, honing their leadership qualities and helping them build character, whilst constantly immersing them in an aviation filled environment.

Students who have gone through the four-year SYFC CCA Programme are hence much more comprehensively equipped, with both aviation knowledge and lifeskills, to enter SYFC's more demanding Flying Training Course en route to fulfilling their dreams of taking to the skies as pilots.

MINDEF Internship Programme

As part of the MINDEF Internship Programme, Paya Lebar Air Base (PLAB) hosted 22 junior college students on 29 Nov 05. The programme, which spans seven days, took students nominated by their schools for their good academic and co-curricular activity records to various MINDEF/SAF installations and facilities. Through discussions and visits to the services, SAFTI Military Institute,

Defence Science and Technology Agency and Defence Science Organisation, the students gained greater insight into the roles and capabilities of MINDEF/SAF as well as challenges of a career with the organisation.

At PLAB, the students were briefed on the structure and the organisation of the RSAF and experienced a familiarisation

on a CH-47D Chinook. The students also viewed a static display of an F-5S Tiger. "This visit has actually revealed to me several things about the RSAF that I may not have realised," said Mr Koo Chee Hoe from Victoria Junior College. "I've always thought the SAF is all about regimentation and discipline, but after sitting on the Chinook today, I've actually really enjoyed the freedom of being in the skies and it's given me a new perspective on how the RSAF defends our airspace."

This is the second of such internship programmes organised by MINDEF Scholarship Centre and Joint Operations Department. The pilot programme was first conducted in 2003.

New Initiatives for a Transforming WOSA Corps

Transformation Towards a 3G RSAF



The demands on the RSAF today are significantly greater than yesteryears. Today, the RSAF continues to work round the clock in sustaining our 24/7 Homeland Air Security posture, which has now become an integral part of Air Force operations. Not only have we maintained our Peacetime Support Operations (PSO) commitment by sending KC-135 to the Gulf, we also took on Humanitarian Assistance and Disaster Relief (HADR) operations on an unprecedented scale at a moment's notice with the Boxing Day Tsunami Disaster. Going forward, we can only expect the demands on the RSAF to continue to head north. Hence, it is crucial for the RSAF to transform quickly so as to become more effective and efficient in doing what we are doing today, in order to create more capacity to take on the new challenges that may come our way. This article will give a flavour of some broad areas that the RSAF will be looking into in the years to come.

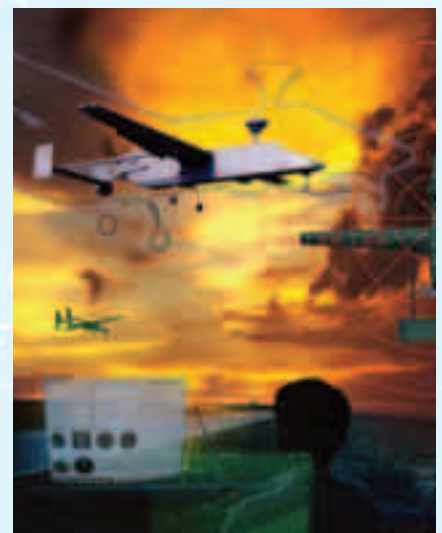
Three Pillars for Transformation - Technology, Concepts, People

While the metamorphosis of a caterpillar into a glorious butterfly requires it to remain in a cocoon, it is quite unlikely that RSAF can afford such luxury. The RSAF's transformation journey towards a 3G force, more capable of handling the expanded spectrum of threats across the various domains, is not predicated on just fielding new technologies alone. Tomorrow's military capabilities will depend on the right investment in enabling technologies, integrating and employing them with our new operational concepts, and more importantly, by people who are properly trained and willing to embrace the new concepts. Without proper doctrines and correctly skilled war fighters, the newest machines will not generate the airpower that allows the RSAF to continue its dominant role in future battles. Hence, the three pillars for our transformation: Technology, Concepts and People.

Technology

The employment of new technologies in the recent conflicts, from Operation Desert Storm to Operation Iraqi Freedom, has provided the world a glimpse of what technology can offer if we are willing to embrace it. The common CNN video of precision guided munitions hitting the target at exactly the right place is only the end-point of a process involving a complex array of inputs and information that enable it to arrive at the right place, at the right time.

Some key technological areas that will enable dominance in the battlefield are precision strike capability, information networks and unmanned platforms. While these technologies are not uniquely applied to the utilisation of airpower, they will provide the foundation for the RSAF to leapfrog in our capability development. For example, one traditional key weakness of airpower lies in its impermanence. However, with the technology of unmanned platforms like the Global Hawk (a large unmanned aircraft), 24-hour coverage of the battlefield can already be achieved. With the eventual advent of unmanned strike platforms, not only will there be round-the-clock intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance (ISR) coverage of the battlefield, the enemy will not have breathing space between pauses in air strikes encountered today.



Transformation Towards a 3G RSAF

Concepts

Technology in itself is of little use if it is not complemented by the appropriate concepts of employment. In order for the RSAF to maintain itself as a modern airforce, transformational concepts and appropriate deployment will be needed to propel the RSAF to greater heights.

Air Dominance

In the past, control of the air was achieved through the decisive application of airpower against installations or infrastructure used by hostile forces. The central idea is that with the destruction of the installations or infrastructure, the generation of hostile airpower can be stopped, thus allowing us to achieve air dominance. Looking forward, technology may be able to provide cost-effective alternatives in the form of surface-launched precision-strike missiles. This would radically alter the air dominance conceptual equation in two ways. First, application of fires on installations or infrastructure can be done using a more diversified set of strike means. Where the balance lies, however, will remain something for us to examine. Second, if airpower can be applied through a variety of means, achieving air dominance will be more than the destruction of installations and infrastructure. The ability to target elusive missile launchers and ship-based missile launchers will increasingly be part of the air dominance campaign.

Dominating from the Air

Coming back to the earlier example of unmanned platforms, UAVs allow us to overcome the transient nature of airpower with their long endurance. With their persistence, unmanned systems carrying good sensor payloads have the unique ability to paint the battlespace continuously. Coupled with on-demand air strikes as mentioned above, UAVs allow us to employ the concept of applying force in a timely and precise manner. The result is one where the enemy faces certain destruction each time he moves. Such persistence denies the enemy any opportunity to reconstitute. This can be so demoralising to any ground soldier or naval combatant that the mere presence of unmanned systems could cause the collapse of their morale and cohesion.



People

New technologies and concepts offer new opportunities. Nevertheless, in order to make the most of these opportunities, a similar transformation in our organisational structure and people is required. Ultimately, it is the people who can harness and exploit technology in revolutionary ways that will make the critical difference. The challenge for the organisation is to create an environment which encourages the unleashing of the innovative minds of our people. Generally, a spirit of experimentation, openness, and intelligent risk-taking are some important attributes which should be encouraged.

Operationally, the transformation journey ahead is going to be filled with new ideas, some of which may seem to contradict our traditional norms. It would be useful to clarify the merits of each idea in the different specific context. However, the key point is to be cognisant of the dangers of falling into the mental traps of perceiving available options in terms of discrete "1" or "0". Rather, the real opportunity lies in the potential of creating systems that are truly flexible and adaptive to prevailing conditions and requirements. Adaptiveness through continuous learning will truly be a premium competitive advantage for the RSAF, especially at a time when many agree that the only certainty about the future is uncertainty.

Making History in Twentynine Palms, U.S.A.: EX Forging Sabre

Across the barren plains of the Mojave desert, in the largest U.S. Marine Corps training facility on earth, the SAF made history on several fronts in its first integrated strike exercise, codenamed Forging Sabre. Held from 10-21 Nov 05 at the US Marine Air Ground Task Force Training Centre (MAGTFTC) in Twentynine Palms, California - a training area that is twice the size of Singapore - Forging Sabre was SAF's first unilateral exercise conducted in Continental USA. The exercise also marked the first time that elements from all three of RSAF's US-based detachments - Peace Prairie, Peace Vanguard and Peace Carvin II - operated with Army elements and unmanned aerial vehicles within a live-fire exercise setting.



COL Philip Lim, the overall Exercise Director, explained the nature of integration that Forging Sabre entailed. "This is really a live process integration, vertically from the division headquarters, right down to the platform, as well as horizontal integration across platforms and services," said COL Lim.



"By working face-to-face, both the Army and the RSAF exercise participants were better able to understand the complexities and intricacies of each other's operations, especially in the areas of mission planning, execution consideration and terminology," said Exercise Director (Air) COL Sarbjit Singh.

It was indeed such integration of services and platforms that Forging Sabre sought to validate. The exercise saw RSAF AH-64D Longbow attack helicopters, CH-47D Chinook helicopters, the Unmanned Aerial Vehicle and F-16C/D Fighting Falcons integrate with the artillery systems and commandos as one combined force.



"The biggest challenge is to integrate with the other units that are here - the commandos, the artillery and the UAVs from the RSAF," said Peace Vanguard Detachment Commander, LTC Christopher Wong.

"All this while we've been operating autonomously in the U.S. and working mainly with the U.S. Army. Now we've got a great opportunity to work with our own forces and it's been a great challenge for us," he added.



Supply Specialist 1SG Jayalakshmi has never experienced such interaction and coordination with her counterparts in the Army before, and says that she has come off better from it. "We are exercising

with the other services and it has been an experience to communicate and exchange ideas with them. We interact with other technicians and learn more about their roles as well as techniques," she said, adding that she intended to pass her new-found operational knowledge to her colleagues back in Peace Vanguard.



The need to know the concept of operations from other services was equally appreciated by CPT Cheong Kok Seen, an Instructor Pilot on the Apache. "This is the first time that we are actually integrating with the ground units and the other platforms in the SAF. So the biggest challenge is how to better understand the concept of operations of the other units for the different types of missions they carry out," he said. He added that such integration was a "stepping stone" in RSAF's transformation into a 3rd Generation (3G) Air Force.

Sharing his sentiments was MAJ Foo Tee Jong. As the Commando Liaison officer, MAJ Foo served as the direct link between the exercise headquarters and the commandos out in the area of operations.



"The exercise has been an enlightening and eye-opening experience for my guys. We can see that we are moving very much ahead as a 3rd Generation force with new technology," said MAJ Foo.

The UAV community is one such fraternity that is likely to be heavily involved in this transformational journey. In Forging Sabre, the UAV detachment - RSAF's first to the U.S. - served as the "eyes in the sky", providing the "shooters" with an aerial picture of the simulated enemy's location.

Operating out of the same platform and runway as their counterparts in the manned aircraft was a significant departure from the dedicated, isolated airfield the detachment is used to, back home in Murai Camp. "Back home we're more or less isolated and operate out of our own airfield whereas here we conduct multiple air platform operations with all the other exercise participants, within the same area of operations and from the same runway as well," said LTA Ramesh Chandran, an UAV Pilot. "It's something that we've learnt a lot from and will definitely be useful for future exercises," he added.

The safety issues that arise from such sharing of airfields and airspace by so many different air platforms is just one of the numerous potential hazards that Chief

Safety Officer LTC Paul Sung and his two deputies had to look into.

The Flight crew faced flight hazards mid-air due to the numerous air assets involved in the exercise, while on the ground, troops had to contend with the harsh, unpredictable desert climate. In addition, the entire exercise area, being a live-fire area, had been littered with Unexploded Ordnance, which could go off if stepped on.

With thorough planning and a robust safety structure and monitoring, the safety team was able to minimise any risk that existed to a minimum and accomplish a 100% accident-free rate for the exercise.

"We've instilled multiple layers of safety. At the top level is the leadership, with the second level being the management overseeing what the units are doing. We



also conduct inspections and spot-checks and preach individual situational awareness," said LTC Sung. "Because this exercise is in a foreign environment, not all the hazards can be picked out immediately. Everyone has to be aware, looking out across their boundaries to identify problems," he added.

The twelve-day exercise emerged a resounding success, showcasing slices of the three core capabilities of the 3rd Generation (3G) SAF – precision strike, unmanned warfare, and Integrated Knowledge Command and Control (IKC2). The success of the exercise demonstrated the sensor-shooter linkages across various SAF platforms and services and validated the 3G integrated strike concept.

EX Forging Sabre also saw visits from Minister for Manpower and Second Minister for Defence, Dr Ng Eng Hen and Chief of Staff (Air Staff), BG Ng Chee Khern. Both of them took time to visit the personnel and view the area where the first integrated live-fire demonstration was held on 21 Nov. They also attended numerous detailed briefings by the SAF units on detachment, to have a better appreciation of the exercise

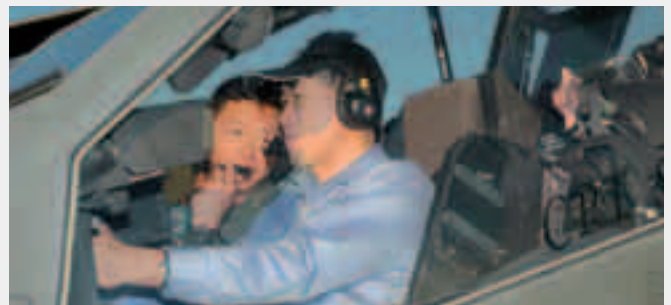

On 19 Nov 05, BG Ng called on the Chief of Staff, MAGTFEC, COL James R. Braden. BG Ng was also given a tour of the facilities at Camp Wilson, where the SAF troops were stationed.

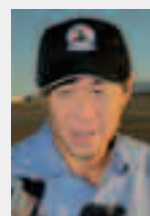

"When we embarked on this journey of the 3G SAF, one of the fundamental aspects was to use superior platforms, superior technology to multiply our effects."

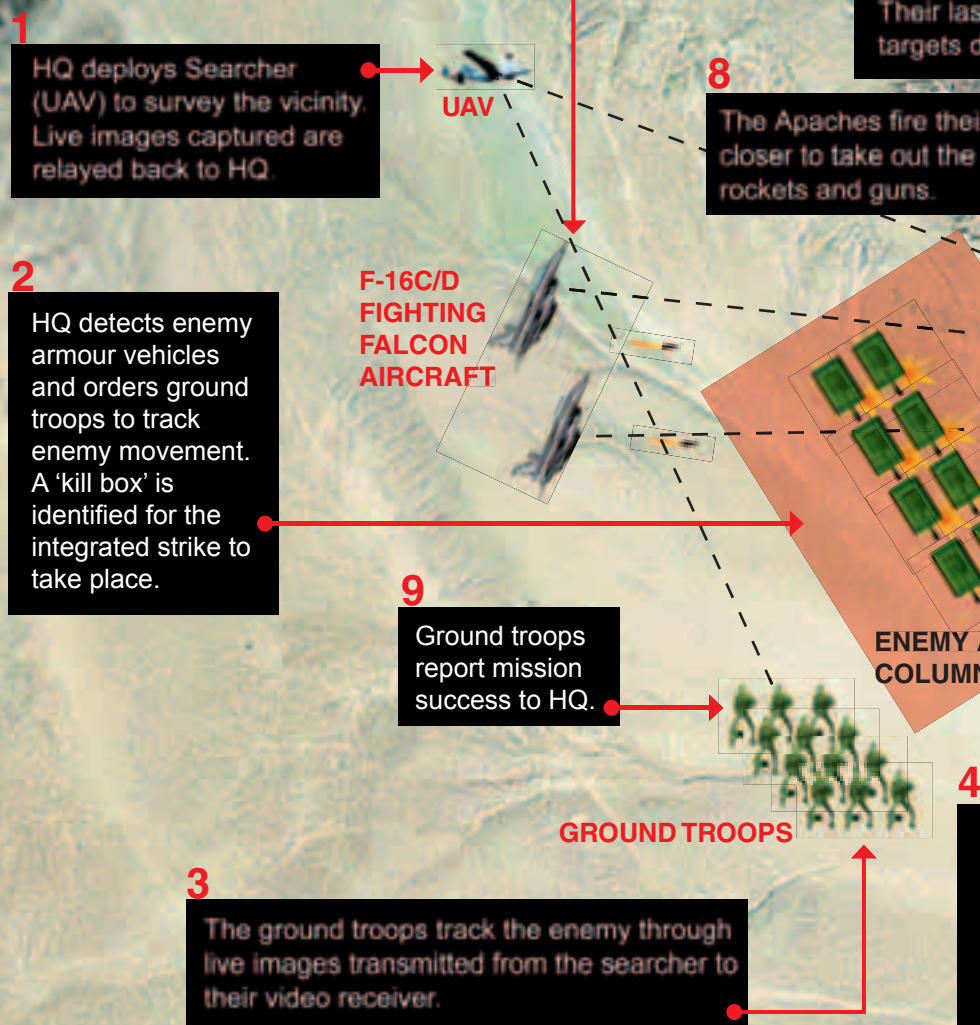
"You need exercises like this to convince yourself that you can put the various platforms, the various technologies together."

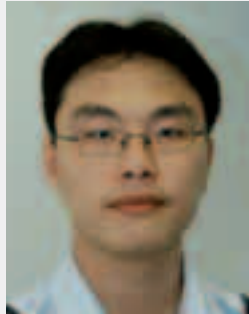

The award is a major milestone for ALS-SBAB's OE journey and is a testament to RSAF's progress towards her vision of a First Class Air Force with World Class people. Avian Influenza: What you should know



Flu vaccines such as Tamiflu (above) may have an integral role to play in the event of an outbreak; but widespread and indiscriminate use of the vaccines may limit its effectiveness.

Birds may be a nuisance for pilots and air traffic controllers everywhere, but they may now present a completely new danger to populations around the world. Avian influenza, also known as bird flu, is a contagious disease caused by viruses that normally infect birds and less commonly pigs, but have on rare occasions infected humans with fatal consequences. With fresh reports of new infections in China and Turkey, and many countries in South East Asia and East Asia affected by the virus, there is a clear and present threat that the virus may mutate and become contagious amongst humans. While there is no cause for alarm yet as the virus has not mutated to a stage where it can transmit effectively between humans, there is significant risk that if more people contract the disease from birds, then the chances that the virus can mutate to a more infectious stage is higher. Avian influenza symptoms are not very different from human influenza

symptoms – fever, cough, sore throat, pneumonia amongst others. To date, there have been no reported cases of bird flu in Singapore. As such, local birds are considered safe, and there is no necessity to cull or avoid them. Poultry products, such as eggs, have gone through the strict controls and checks of the Agri-Food and Veterinary Authority (AVA) of Singapore and are thus safe for consumption.

One interesting note about the bird flu virus is its sensitivity to heat, which means that there is no danger of contracting the disease by consuming properly cooked food. According to the World Health Organisation, “normal temperatures used for cooking (70°C in all parts of the food) will kill the virus.” By ensuring your food is properly cooked, that raw poultry is not mixed with any other food and practising good hygiene will protect oneself from the virus.

Studies have shown that the virus spreads through direct contact with infected birds, or touching surfaces with nasal excretions, saliva and faeces of infected birds. When dealing with birds in Singapore, it is still recommended to practise good hygiene practises, such as washing of hands, especially during and after contact with their faeces and corpses.

This advice also extends to overseas travel – there is no real danger of visiting affected countries, if one takes the necessary precautions against contacting wild birds and practising good hygiene. An added precaution one can take is to get a flu vaccination such as Tamiflu or Relenza. There is no vaccine against the current strain of avian influenza, as the ones available only protect a person from the common influenza. Even so, the vaccination can lessen the impact of avian influenza and save lives if taken early. Therefore it is recommended by the Ministry of Health for those travelling to temperate countries in the Northern Hemisphere, those who suspect that they may be exposed to infected chickens or farms when travelling, or those who are at higher risk of developing complications from flu viruses, be vaccinated. Widespread vaccinations and stocking up of vaccines are however not recommended – the possibility that the virus will develop an immunity against the vaccine is much higher this way and will severely limit its effectiveness.

With the facts separated from the myths, it is hoped that RSAF servicemen would take the necessary precautions and actions when they are travelling overseas or at home and protect themselves from this deadly virus.
