A Word from CNV

The month of August saw the conduct of the Proliferation Security Initiative (PSI) Exercise code-named Exercise Deep Sabre, with shore activities in Singapore and a scenario-driven maritime interdiction exercise in the South China Sea from 15-19 August. The RSN played a key role as Sea Exercise Coordinator for this first-ever PSI exercise in this region, with the participation of 10 ships and 6 maritime patrol aircraft, as well as customs and other agencies from 13 countries.

The threat of proliferation of Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMD) is today more immediate and acute with the emergence of global terrorism and the greater ease of acquiring WMD and related materials in our globalised and highly inter-connected world. Given Singapore's size, openness and vulnerability, it is important that the RSN works closely with our domestic agencies as well as navies and agencies from other countries to enhance our capability in countering the threat of WMD proliferation. I am proud to see the exercise successfully conducted with strong leadership from the Fleet in coordinating the efforts from multiple agencies and navies. As a navy, we

have no doubt benefited from the close multilateral cooperation and professional sharing experienced during the exercise, all of which will contribute to the security of our seas and region.

Just a month before that, the RSN witnessed another milestone event in our history: the arrival of the first of our new frigates - RSS Formidable - from France, after a 39-day voyage stretching over 12,000nm. She will be undergoing a rigorous series of combat system trials, as will the other locally built frigates as they are progressively introduced into the Fleet. When operational a few years from now, the frigates will strengthen our Navy's capabilities and form a significant component of our transformation voyage as part of the 3G SAF.

RSS Formidable also joined our other ships at anchor off Marina South as part of the National Day Carnival. Many of our people were involved in our nation's 40th National Day celebrations, both at the National Day Parade at Padang as well as the Carnival at Marina. I would like to thank all who contributed to these celebrations, for their fine efforts, hard work and commitment in putting up a proud display for our fellow Singaporeans. Well done!

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SAF DAY PARADE 2005



THE SAF Day Parade 2005, which was held at SAFTI MI on 1 Jul, marked the 40th year of the Singapore Armed Forces. His Excellency, the President of the Republic of Singapore, S R Nathan was the reviewing officer for the event. Also present at the event

were Minister for Defence Mr. Teo Chee Hean and Chief of Defence Force (CDF) LG Ng Yat Chung.

Mr. Teo presented RSS Resolution with the Best Ship Award at the parade. The Landing Ship Tank (LST) had returned earlier in the year after 6

months in the Gulf as part of Singapore's role in the multinational reconstruction efforts of Iraq. The ship was amongst the 23 SAF units that had achieved the Best Unit and Best National Service (NS) Unit Awards.

At the post-parade reception, RSN's three LSTs, RSS Endurance, RSS Endeavour and RSS Persistence received the Meritorious Service Award while 3rd Flotilla and the Naval Diving Unit received the Commendable Service Award. The President presented the awards to 33 units for their contributions in Operation Flying Eagle (OFE)

A highlight in the military calendar, the SAF Day Parade is a reminder of the importance of Military Defence. It is an occasion to renew the allegiance to the President and the Country, to remember comrades who lost their lives in the course of service in the SAF, and to give recognition to the best in the Armed Forces

COSCOM Change of Command



COL Tan Wee Beng took over the command of Coastal Command from COL Chng Teow Hiang at a Change of Command Ceremony held at Tuas Naval Base on 8 July. Chief of Navy, RADM Ronnie Tay witnessed the ceremony.

In his inauguration address, COL Tan said: "COSCOM's mission

is seaward defence and ensuring the security of the Singapore Strait. It is an important mission that is crucial to the well-being of our country . . . I look forward to working closely as a team with everyone from COSCOM, and also with our partners from MPA, PCG, ICA and DSTA to achieve the mission."

COL Tan also paid tribute to the numerous achievements of COL Chng and thanked him for his contributions to the Formation. "We are fortunate to have you as the 7th COSCOM Commander, particularly as the maritime security environment has been a challenging one," COL Tan affirmed.

Prior to his new appointment as Commander COSCOM, COL Tan served as Commander Naval Diving

Unit and more recently Head of Naval Intelligence.

In his farewell speech, COL Chng said: "Given [COL Tan's] varied experience and academic achievements, I am sure that he will transform COSCOM to become a 3G organization in tandem with the SAF vision of a 3G force . . . A big thank you to everyone in COSCOM for giving your best and in so doing making my tour in COSCOM a rewarding and successful one. "

COL Chng will retire from the SAF after a meritorious 30 years of service in the RSN. He will transit to a second career with the Maritime and Port Authority.

FAREWELL, OLD LADY!!!

THE date was 11 August 2005. There were no farewells, and little did the many of the onlookers know that it was the last voyage which would ever be undertaken by the Ex-RSS Intrepid (L203). The vessel was making its last voyage to a scrap yard in Chittagong, BANGLADESH.

L203 was bought from the USN by RSN in 1975 together with 4 of her sister LSTs. The ship set off on its maiden voyage with the RSN to Kaoshiung, Taiwan on 11 Jun 1977.

L203's illustrious career in RSN has seen notable operational deployments such as Ops Surya Bhaskara Jaya, a socio-economic operation that saw it deployed to various parts of the Indonesian Archipelago to participate in humanitarian operations. It also took part in International Force for East Timor (INTERFET) operations in East Timor.

L203 was finally decommissioned on 23 Nov 2000 after 23 years of sterling service with the RSN.

Launch of RSS Tenacious

The Republic of Singapore Navy's (RSN) fourth frigate, RSS Tenacious, was launched on 15 Jul by Mrs. Lalitha Jayakumar, wife of Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Law, Prof. S. Jayakumar, who officiated the ceremony. Minister for Manpower and Second Minister for Defence Dr. Ng Eng Hen as well as Chief of Navy (CNV) RADM Ronnie Tay were also present for the ceremony.

In his speech, Prof. Jayakumar said that the RSN's new frigates "will be able to make a significant contribution to the defence of our nation as well as the safety and security of international waterways in our region".

Prof. Jayakumar added: "Preserving safety in navigation, combating piracy and preventing acts of terrorism – all these are the roles and responsibilities that the RSN, together with regional and extra-regional partners would have to increasingly shoulder in peacetime."

Following the launch, Prof. and Mrs. Jayakumar took a tour of the

interior of the stealth frigate.

RSS Tenacious is the third frigate to be built locally. RSS Tenacious will be undergoing harbour and sea trials following the launch.

Enter the Formidable

After extensive periods of harbour and sea trials in France, RSN's first "Formidable" class stealth frigate, RSS Formidable made its maiden journey around the Cape of Good Hope before arriving at Changi Naval Base (CNB) on 8 Jul. CNV RADM Ronnie Tay and members of the Naval Staff were at hand to welcome the frigate and her crew.

RADM Tay and other invited guests then stepped onboard the ship for the first time and were given a tour of the various parts of the ship, and had a first-hand look at the stealth frigate's capabilities.

RADM Tay then officially unveiled the new squadron logo for 185 SQN.





The New 185 SQN – The Formidable Squadron

The arrival of RSS Formidable marks the start of a new beginning for 185 SQN, which has been renewed to become the new frigate squadron. The squadron has also adopted a new logo and motto.

The trident, made up of the arrows, the ship and the black wake, symbolizes supremacy at the sea. The prongs of the trident depict the capability of the frigate to engage in all three dimensions of naval warfare, namely the anti-air warfare, underwater warfare and surface warfare. The ship silhouette reflects its stealth, and the naval helicopter represents its air capability.

The new motto for the frigate squadron is "Forward with Fortitude".

Defence Minister visits RSS Formidable

Minister for Defence, Mr. Teo Chee Hean, sailed onboard RSS Formidable on 5 Aug.

Mr. Teo was briefed on the advanced capabilities and the operational concept of the ship, as well as on the various advanced shipboard systems, weapons and sensors on board.

Commenting on how the RSN's frigates would enhance the operational capabilities of the RSN, Mr. Teo said: "the Formidable represents also one of the transformational capabilities of the SAF because what you see on the surface of it is a ship but the most important part of the ship is really the combat systems. She's able to network with other ships, aircraft, her own helicopter and shore facilities so she's really a node in the whole network warfare concept we are developing for the SAF."

RSN Hosts One of the largest Anti-Proliferation EX

WHAT happens when a rogue merchant ship carrying an illegal shipment of chemicals that could be used for the manufacture of weapons of mass destruction (WMD) sets sail for a portentous destination and is detected near the shores of Singapore?



That was the scenario faced by participants of Exercise Deep Sabre (XDS), a multinational maritime interdiction exercise under the Proliferation Security Initiative (PSI) from 15 – 19 Aug. Hosted by the Republic of Singapore Navy (RSN), it was the 17th such exercise of the PSI series and was also the first to be held in Southeast Asia.

Officiating at the Opening Ceremony of XDS at Changi Naval Base (CNB) on 15 Aug, Guest-of-Honour Minister for Defence Teo Chee Hean said: "PSI provides the international community with a useful means of plugging the gaps in the existing counter-proliferation system. When domestic systems of export controls fail, and when the treaty regimes are circumvented, PSI creates an effective mechanism for states to work together to interdict WMD-related cargoes that

are already in transit by sea, air or land."

XDS was one of the largest PSI exercises to date, including some 2000 military, coast guard and customs personnel from 13 countries with a total of ten surface vessels, six maritime patrol aircrafts (MPAs), nine boarding teams including numerous experts and observers. The RSN fielded 400 personnel, 3 ships and two MPAs for the exercise. Among the ships involved were RSS Endurance and RSS Vigour.

Besides Singapore, other participating PSI nations included Australia, Canada, France, Germany, Greece, Italy, Japan, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Russia, the United Kingdom and the United States of America. Observers from Asian countries like Brunei, Malaysia, Pakistan and Vietnam were also invited to the 5-day long exercise to join in the proceedings.

Participants of XDS engaged in an intensive series of activities, including a shore-based table-top exercise covering discussions on international law and inter-operability with harbour training in ship-boarding exercises.

The intensive two and-a-half day sea phase of the maritime interdiction exercise began with the collection of intelligence on the rogue ship. Participants from the PSI nations then set up a Combined Coordination Centre (CCC) in CNB where they met and deliberated on the options they could take in order to search for and interdict the vessel that was suspected of carrying WMD-related material.

Sea-phase participating countries (Singapore, Australia, Japan, New Zealand, the United Kingdom, the United States of America) then deployed their maritime and air assets





to detect and trail the rogue ship transporting the shipment of dual-use chemicals which was found traveling in the international waters of the South China Sea. When the request for the ship to voluntarily divert to Singapore's port for a search was rejected, flag state consent was sought and given for the ship to be interdicted and diverted to Singapore for the port search.

A team from the RSN's Naval Diving Unit (NDU) was first to board the vessel. After the ship was secured by the NDU team, follow-on forces from the Singapore Armed Forces (SAF) Chemical, Biological, Radiological and Explosive (CBRE) Defence Group, the Japan Coast Guard and Australian Customs Service boarded the vessel and conducted a preliminary search and investigation.

Following indications of a suspicious cargo on board, the ship was then escorted back to Pasir Panjang Port for a more extensive by domestic enforcement agencies.

Speaking to the media, Exercise Director RSN Fleet Commander RADM Chew Men Leong said: "The gathering of assets here [for the exercise] is really a demonstration of the collective will of PSI nations in coming together to tackle this urgent threat of WMD proliferation. And we hope XDS can help contribute to enhance the ability of PSI nations to come together, work together in a cooperative and coordinated manner to tackle the issue of WMD material proliferation."

The event concluded on 19 Aug with a Closing Ceremony where commanders of the participating ships and aircrafts and heads of the various agencies were presented with a commemorative plaque each by Chief of Navy RADM Ronnie Tay.

"I have participated in many exercises throughout my career and this is the smoothest ever. Everything happened right on time, right on schedule!" said CDR Andrew Cully, Captain of USS John Paul Jones.



JOINT MINEX 8/05



THE Republic of Singapore Navy (RSN) and the Indonesian Navy (TNI-AL) conducted a bilateral mine-clearance exercise in the waters off Pulau Bintan and the Philip Channel from 18 to 22 Jul 05. The RSN deployed two 'BEDOK' Class Mine Countermeasure Vessels (MCMVs), RSS BEDOK and RSS PUNGGOL, with the TNI-AL sending two 'KONDOR' class minesweepers, KRI PULAU RIMAU and KRI PULAU RAIBU to participate in the exercise.

EX Joint Minex was first initiated in 1997 with a focus on MCM training. Over the years, the exercise has expanded in depth and scope achieving greater operational capabilities and enhancing bilateral relations between the two navies' MCM Squadrons. This year's exercise scenario saw the two navies conducting MCM operations in a combined effort to ensure that shipping through the waterways are not endangered by mines laid by terrorist groups.

The RSN and the TNI-AL share warm and friendly defence relations. Ex Joint Minex 8/05 has once again enhanced professional interaction and helped to foster mutual understanding and friendship between the two navies.

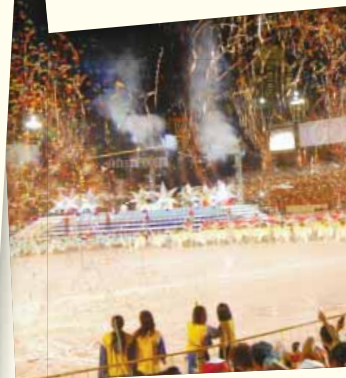
Celebrating 40 Years of Nation Building!

Singaporeans were treated to an intense and thrilling array of performances at the Padang on 9 Aug to celebrate our nation's 40th birthday. Centred around the theme '40 Years of Nation Building', NDP 2005 aimed to showcase the pride and patriotism of all Singaporeans as we reflect upon our last 40 years of nation building and achievements. NDP 05 paid tribute to our elder generation of citizens as well as celebrate the vitality and dynamism of our younger generation.

A special feature of this year's parade was a series of large-scale celebrations which were also held simultaneously at Yishun, Tampines, Jurong East and Marina South. 'Live' feeds allowed all the spectators at different venues to interact via real-time visuals and sound as they watched the entire event comprising of an array of performances such as the show segment, the parachuting of the Red Lions, the fly-past by the RSAF and the crowd-favourite armoured mobile column which is a regular feature on occasions when NDP was held at the Padang.

As part of the Total Defence showcase at the Carnival@Marina, a 'Naval Country' comprising of the different classes of RSN ships were anchored offshore at Marina Bay. The public also had a chance to catch a glimpse of RSN's first state-of-the-art frigate, RSS Formidable.

More than 50 000 members of the public were estimated to have visited 'Naval Country' and the exhibition booths set up by the RSN. Around 17 000 rode onboard the Fast Craft Utility (FCU) and Fast Craft Equipment and Personnel (FCEP) on their journey to tour the Landing Ship Tanks (LSTs) - RSS Endurance and RSS Persistence.

Those who did not get the opportunity to participate in the tours did not leave 'Naval Country' disappointed either. Members of the Naval Diving Unit (NDU) demonstrated their operational capabilities to the public, simulating an assault on a terrorist ship carrying bio-hazardous materials. From their skilful handling of their Interceptor craft to their fearless boarding of the target ship, members of the public watched in awe through the sea of gasps and applause, especially from the little ones.

The displays were a focal point of the Total Defence showcase at the carnival. Not only did they feature the cutting-edge hardware and capabilities of the RSN, they also demonstrated the overall operational readiness and resilience of our personnel.

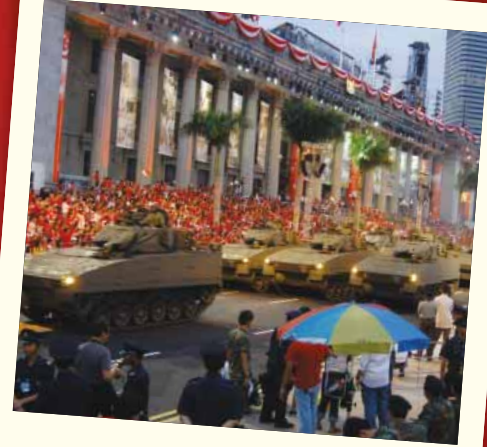
Words from our Parade Commander

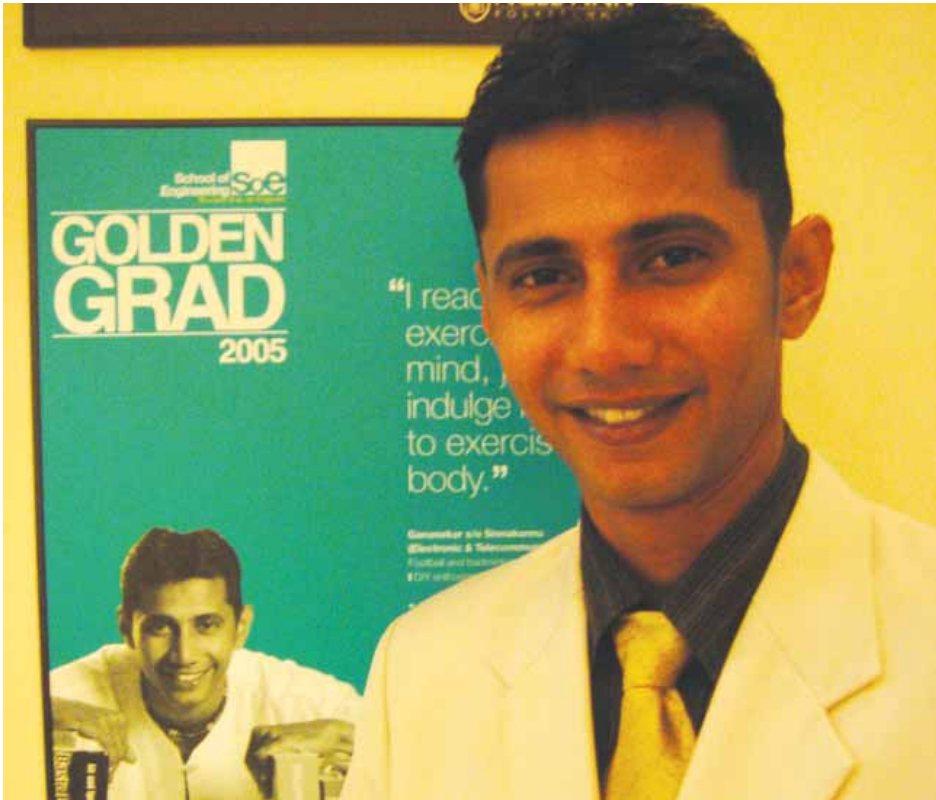

SSG Sekar, as he is better known as, has just graduated with a diploma in Electronics and Telecom Engineering (ETE) from Ngee Ann Polytechnic, where he studied under the Joint Poly-SAF Diploma scheme at the age of 31.

At the age where most people would be already thinking of settling down, why would SSG Sekar think of hitting the books once again?

SSG Sekar, who had only an O-Level qualification prior to his diploma, said: "My grades then were good enough to enter a polytechnic, but I wasn't interested then."

But after having a career and a family, SSG Sekar felt that he wanted to achieve more. He said: "From young, I wanted to achieve many things. Another thing that kept me going was my daughter. I wanted to set an example for her that you can achieve whatever you set out to do as long as you stay focused."

SSG Sekar said that at the initial stage of his polytechnic education, he felt rather weird as he was at least a decade older than most of his peers. However, he managed to fit in eventually and he was someone they looked up to as a leader due to his

work experience.

"I even ended up being "Counter-Strike" buddies with them," he said with a laugh as he recounted on how he used to go LAN gaming with his classmates.

As hard as he played, he also had to juggle between his family and his school work as well which was nothing short of sheer hard work and determination.

"I really want to thank my wife for being so understanding because most of the time I would be hitting the books," SSG Sekar said. "I also had to spend time with my daughter. From the time that I come home after school, which is usually about 5 p.m., I would play and spend time with my daughter as she was only two years old then. Once she goes to sleep at about ten, I would start my revision which would go all the way till 2 a.m. and I would have to go back to school in the morning."

As hectic as his daily routine was, he never gave up and his hard work paid off. SSG Sekar achieved 30 distinctions and five As out of the 35 modules he took over the three years and was awarded the Micron Gold Medal Award, which was presented to the top graduate in his course. He was also awarded the M1 Prize (overall outstanding academic performance in ETE course), the SIAE prize (most

outstanding academic prize in the Avionics Option), a Silver Certificate of Achievement for his involvement in Co- Curricular Activities, 11 Module prizes, 3 Overall Best Performance Awards, three Outstanding Academic Awards and a STAR Award for academic excellence.

And as a testament of his willingness to help his fellow course mates, SSG Sekar was also awarded the kindness award for rendering academic help to weaker students.

SSG Sekar thanks his former Commanding Officer, COL Choo Ah Choon, now Project Director with Frontier Project Office for his support during his three years of studies. He said: "COL Choo was very helpful and he kept giving me lots of encouragements. This really made me really want to shine in my studies and to live up to expectations."

SSG Sekar's achievements truly show that his naval work experience and the maturity that comes with age can be winning assets when it comes to seeking excellence through life-long learning!

Asia's First 'Perisher' Survives!

Ducking under charging warships as they surge forward above at 30 knots.

Navigating through dangerous obstacle courses.

Being under extreme pressure.

Because one mistake may lead to the end of their submarine careers.

Welcome to an action-packed (and definitely not for the faint-hearted) day in internationally sponsored Netherlands Submarine Command Course (SMCC). Navies from around the world send their prospective submarine commanders to undergo this four-month course, which assesses their tactical ability, stamina and leadership to command a submarine. The SMCC is far from a 'guaranteed-pass' course. In fact, it is internationally nicknamed the 'Perisher' course because an average of almost 40% of the participants fail to graduate from their batch.

Meet LTC David Foo. The Commanding Officer of RSS Centurion who graduated from the 2005 batch of

SMCC. Making his feat more impressive is the fact that LTC Foo remains the only Asian who has successfully completed the course!

Despite his impressive achievement, LTC Foo is quick to point out that the SMCC was far from a piece of cake. He explains: "All the students had to sleep in modified torpedo beds and had to stand in a limited space for planning and preparations. There was always sleep deprivation as the workload was continuously demanding, given that most operations were given at short notice in a multi-dimensional high-threat environment"

Presently, LTC Foo remains the only RSN participant of the 'Perisher' course. However, LTC Foo believes that the SMCC is beneficial to the RSN as it "subjects a RSN submariner to evaluation by an internationally recognised training and assessment system for submarine commanders."

In most of the other navies, the 'Perisher' course is a career requirement for submarine officers. However, LTC Foo firmly believes that he has personally benefited from the course as well. Not only has he gained more insight into aspects of leadership and management, but he has also learnt to "recognise his own limitations." He explains: "You need to not only possess determination to do well in the SMCC but also self-discipline. Some

of the missions were designed for the commander's judgement to confirm if it was dangerous to continue. They were meant to be aborted. Even the nature of the missions could have had double meanings in them."

Given the high failure rates and the demanding standards of the 'Perisher' course, would LTC Foo still recommend his colleagues to attempt to follow in his footsteps?

"Go for it!" He exclaims without hesitation. He elaborates: "There is no other submarine course that has the same legendary status as the SMCC. Furthermore, you'd be hard-pressed to find another course that can match the amount of resources and effort devoted to the 'Perisher'."

Radiating a quiet, but calm and confident aura throughout the interview, LTC Foo's words highlighted his confidence in his fellow RSN submariners: "We have all been imbued with the 'Never Say Die' attitude. Quitting is never an option. Coupled with our high training standards, I believe that every one of my colleagues has the potential to survive the 'Perisher'!"



Making New Waves – RSN's First Female LTCs

THROUGHOUT their careers, they've created history and these two ladies have done it once again. With their recent promotions, which took effect in July, LTC Tay Poh Ling and LTC Lam Ee Her became the first two ladies to achieve the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel (LTC) in the Republic of Singapore Navy (RSN).

Both ladies were amongst the first Female Naval Officers (FNO) in the RSN, with LTC Tay having enlisted as part of the first batch of FNOs in late 1990 and LTC Lam the second batch in 1991.

LTC Tay, the Deputy Commanding Officer of 121 SQN and LTC Lam, currently a student at the Singapore Command and Staff College, were amongst the first female Commanding Officers of RSN vessels. LTC Tay was the very first FNO to hold command of RSS Fearless, an anti-submarine patrol vessel (APV) and she subsequently took command of RSS Sea Scorpion. LTC Lam was first FNO to hold command of RSS Freedom, a patrol vessel (PV).

When asked how she felt about being the first female LTC, LTC Tay expressed her thanks for "the wonderful crew that [she] had onboard RSS Sea Scorpion, who worked tirelessly in all the tasks assigned. Some examples were their successful hit during a Missile firing in 2003, their 57mm gun shooting down the towed target during two routine Anti-Air firing exercises,

LTC Lam attributed her success to "a good working environment and excellent support from colleagues and

superiors at INTO, TRACOM and also COSCOM, with whom I have worked closely with and have learnt much from over the years and I am very thankful for the knowledge and experiences they have shared with me, their guidance, advices and support, especially from my previous Commanding Officers, Col Choo Ah Choon and LTC Alex Yit".

Looking ahead, LTC Lam said that the promotion was not going to change the way she worked because "as officers, we always play our part to be the best we can be", but she "looks forward to giving back even more to the RSN".

LTC Tay elaborated: "The promotion is not 'the end'; it merely marks another phase of my journey here with the RSN. It's definitely a phase with even greater responsibility and challenges."

FEW may know about the presence of female personnel in the Navy stretches back to the days when the Royal Navy was in charge of Singapore's defence.

In 1939, when war seem inevitable, the Admiralty decided that women's service auxillary would go a long way in solving manpower shortage problems within the Navy. Hence the Woman's Royal Naval Service was formed. Female personnel undertook tasks such as dispatch riders

and wireless telegraphists, the latter vocation being the first group of female personnel to be based overseas in Singapore.

In 1967, after the separation of Singapore from the Federation of Malaysia, the Navy or the Singapore Naval Volunteer Force as it was known then, had a strength of 89 mobilised personnel and 278 volunteer officers and men. This group included women from the Singapore Women's Auxiliary Naval Service, and better known simply as the SWANS.
