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Minister Visits 171 and 191



THE Minister for Defence, RADM (NS) Teo Chee Hean, visited 171 and 191 Squadrons at Changi Naval Base (CNB) on 3 Mar. During his visit, he was accompanied by Chief of Navy, RADM Ronnie Tay and Fleet Commander, COL James Soon.

RADM (NS) Teo visited RSS Conqueror and 171 Squadron HQ, where he was briefed by CO 171 Sqn, COL Cyril Lee. He then proceeded to RSS Endurance for a briefing by CO 191 Sqn, LTC S. S. Chopra. RADM (NS) Teo interacted with the crew of RSS Endurance, 171 Squadron and 191 Squadron during an informal meet-the-people session. He congratulated the personnel involved in the Iraqi



reconstruction efforts and 171 Squadron for the successful return of all four submarines.

In his address, RADM (NS) Teo emphasised the importance of the Iraq reconstruction mission, making reference to the anti-terrorist efforts, "From time to time, we will have to go out there and help solve these problems, before the problems come over here and arrive at our doorstep."

RADM (NS) also added that RSN's professionalism during the mission had brought credit to the RSN and recognition from other Coalition forces including the Americans and French counterparts, "The reputation is built by what you do and how you operate. It is not something which... you can put on an TV advertisement and try to convince people about."


ACCORD Visits TRACOM

RSN WORKPLAN 2004

THE theme for this year's Republic of Singapore Navy (RSN) Workplan Seminar held on 31 Mar was "Towards the World Class Navy – Constantly Ready and Transforming in a Changing World". While the seminar was held at the Ministry of Defence auditorium, RSN personnel were also able to participate via teleconferencing at the Changi Naval Base auditorium. Gracing the seminar was Minister for Defence, RADM (NS) Teo Chee Hean, while Minister of State for Defence, Mr. Cedric Foo, delivered the keynote address.

Chief of Navy, RADM Ronnie Tay, set out his directions for the RSN for Workyear 2004. He highlighted the RSN's increased roles and responsibilities in maritime security and Military Operations Other Than War (MOOTW). RSN needs to continue to maintain a high level of operational readiness to meet these increased roles. At the same time, the RSN will continue to place emphasis on transforming itself, through the operationalisation of the frigates and conduct a series of experimentation projects.

"Working on the topical presentation gave my team members an opportunity to present their ideas on how the RSN can further contribute



in enhancing the SAF's role in deterrence and diplomacy well into the future in front of an important audience. It has been an enriching and satisfying experience for them and myself", said MAJ Lee Swee Ann, one of the study team leaders involved in the workplan.

And as another team leader, MAJ Lim Khia Teck, said: "My team gave a presentation on the future of Naval training. We came to the conclusion that excellence and commitment in training harnesses the full potential of our Naval personnel to successfully fulfil any demanding mission required of us."

RADM Tay pointed out to seminar participants that with the increased capabilities and operations, exercising fiscal prudence has become a way of life in the RSN. Management frameworks will be put in place to better manage resources. Finally, RADM Tay stressed that people remained the key factor to RSN's success. The review of officers' training, enlarging WOSR warfare roles on the new frigates and developing routes of advancement for our personnel are some of the initiatives that will be undertaken.





Sea Riding Team Set to Make Waves

AN effective naval fighting force is one that is always operationally ready, sea-worthy and most importantly a safety-conscious one. The Sea Riding Team (SRT) was established in mid-2003 to enhance the safety and operational processes of our naval units operating at sea.

Comprising 3 officers and 2 warrant officers, the SRT is led by LTC Alec Lim of 171 Squadron. These experienced members are all highly specialised and trained in their respective professions.

The mission of the team is to create value enhancement to the RSN by promoting good practices, especially with regards to safety issues such as Navigation/Seamanship, Engineering, Personal Safety and Fire-Fighting Damage Control.

The SRT will tag along for sorties onboard the various vessels across different platforms throughout the year. Whilst the ships' crews carry on with their tasks at hand, the SRT observe their actions in the background, and provide recommendation after the sorties.

Said LTC Lim: "There is a need to share good practices, especially to the younger generation. They may unconsciously forget the basic fundamentals during their course of work or when under pressure. For example, we have observed during our sorties that fixtures onboard the ships may not be strapped down in case of rough weather or personnel not maintaining a tidy bunk."

After each sortie, a debrief will be held where observations and suggestions are shared with the ship's

crew. LTC Lim stressed that the role of the SRT is to provide recommendations and not enforcement.

2WO Jesvinder Singh from 185 Squadron, who is also a member of the SRT, believes that even with the high safety standards and best practices in place, there is always room for improvement. "Day in, day out, the crew may get jaded listening to their coxswain or officers harping on the same issues. After a while, the message may not get across to them. However,

we are seen as a third-party and they tend to be more receptive to our 'different perspectives'," said 2WO Singh.

The concept of the SRT was mooted by former Commander TRACOM, COL Tan Wei Ming. The current members perform their SRT duties concurrently with their primary jobs. LTC Lim said: "The results of our efforts have been very encouraging as they jumpstart the learning curve of the younger sailors. I would definitely like to see the SRT expand."

Swimming Proficiency Screen for Pre-Enlistees

A pre-enlistment screening initiative between Naval Personnel Department (NPD) and Institute of Naval Technologies and Operations (INTO) was set up recently. The inaugural swimming proficiency screening test was conducted at INTO on 4 Mar. Ten Pre-enlistees, 8 males and 2 females were asked to swim 50 metres, followed by water-treading for 3 minutes and finally jump off a 3-metre diving platform.

Commanding Officer INTO, LTC Choo Ah Choon explained the objective

of the test was to determine the enlistees' proficiency in swimming and tolerance for height, as all naval specialists must attain CAT 1 Swimming status before they can be deployed for duties onboard ships. In the past, a few regular servicemen could not pass the swimming test and had to leave the RSN due to fear of height or inability to swim. This initiative is a positive step toward ensuring we continue to select quality people for a quality navy.

Underwater Warfare Forum 2004

THE 2nd Underwater Warfare (UW) Forum was organised at the Changi Defence Squadron (CDS) Auditorium on 23 Feb. About 80 personnel from 188, 189 and 171 Sqn, NUWC, NLO, DSTA and DSO attended the forum. Gracing the event was Fleet Commander, COL James Soon.

In his welcome address, Head NUWC, COL Ng Seng Leong highlighted the challenges the Underwater Warfare

community faces, especially with the limited manpower and resources. COL Ng stressed that it was crucial for NUWC to establish close partnerships with the various internal units and external establishments to leverage on and integrate the wide field of UW expertise.

COL Soon told the audience that the NUWC was an initiative to better harness and exploit the advances in technology and system hardware in our

unique operational environment. He also encouraged participants to explore UW technology beyond the military context – in the areas of commercial application where such technology was flourishing.

During the forum, various papers, on underwater warfare were presented by the participants from NID, 171 and 189 Squadrons, NUWC and DSO.

India and Singapore Navies in Anti-Submarine Warfare Exercise



THE Indian Navy (IN) and the Republic of Singapore Navy (RSN) conducted the 11th annual Anti-Submarine Warfare (ASW) exercise in Kochi, India, from 7 – 19 Mar. The exercise was jointly opened by IN Chief of Staff Rear-Admiral Rakesh Kala NM and RSN Commander First Flotilla COL Ng Chee Peng.

The exercise comprised of two

sea phases and three harbour phases. The highlight of this year's sea phase was the firing of an exercise torpedo by one of the RSN's anti-submarine patrol vessels. This marks the second time that the RSN has fired a torpedo at a submarine.

The harbour phase included training and professional interactions between the RSN and the Indian Naval

Training establishments at Kochi such as the ASW School, and the Navigation and Direction School. They also visited the Naval Physical and Oceanographic Laboratory where indigenous and latest technologies in underwater acoustics and sonar were displayed.

Both navies also participated in community service at a local school for children with special needs.

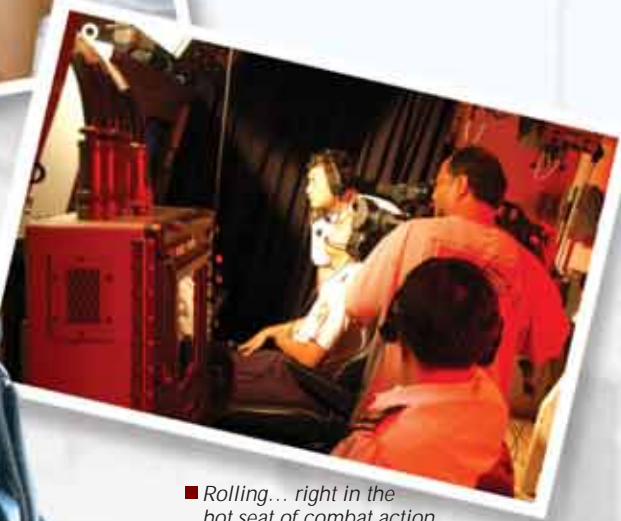
Okay, okay, that was on the then-Singapore Broadcasting Corporation (SBC) Channel 8's Chinese drama serial.

This was the motivation for me to compose the song as a tribute to the people." He also wanted everyone onboard to take home "something to remember" and also to "leave a legacy behind".

CPT Quek reiterated that professionalism was key to managing his crew. "During the day, we make sure that we worked hard. After work, we try to come together as a crew to enjoy ourselves and foster team spirit and camaraderie."

Interestingly enough,

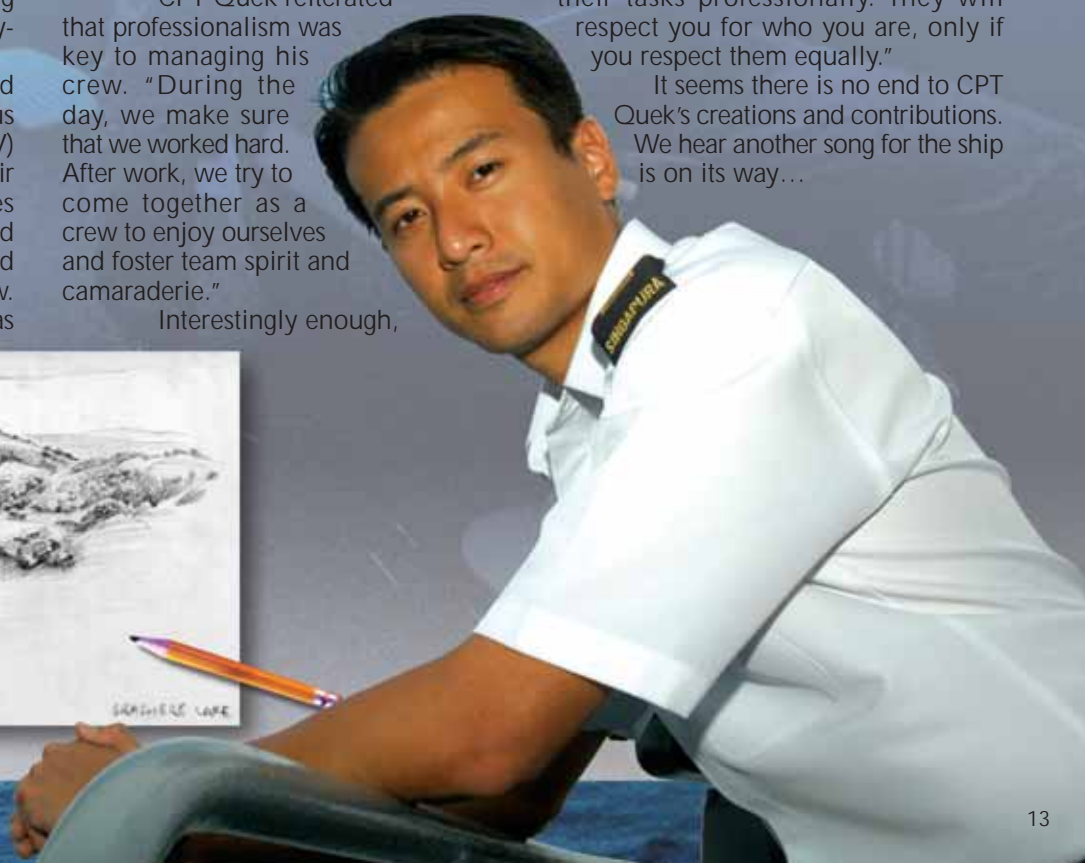
some of our readers may have even seen CPT Quek in a few of our popular local magazines recently for his charitable efforts and talents.

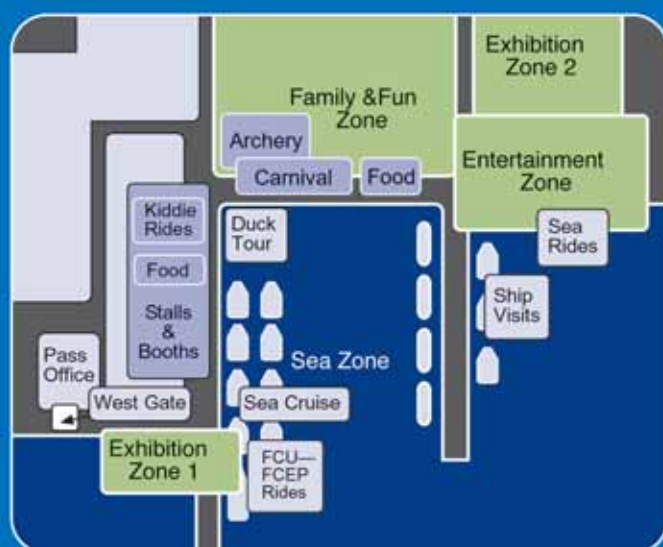
